WHA 71 Highlights

Launch of WHO NCD Investment Case, <u>Saving lives, spending less: A Strategic</u> <u>Response to NCDs</u>


- World's poorest countries can gain US\$350 billion by 2030 by scaling up investments in preventing and treating NCDs at an additional cost of US\$1.27 per person annually - saving 8 million lives
- For every US\$1 invested in scaling up actions to address NCDs in low- and lower-middle-income countries (LLMICs), there will be a return to society of at least US\$7 in increased employment, productivity and longer life

11.7 Preparation for third UN HLM on NCDs

Documents A71/14 and A71/14 Add.1

Member State Discussions

- Whole of society approach (engage NSAs, health workforce, communities); financial investment; public awareness campaigns
- Challenge of policy coherence between economics and trade and health environments remains a challenge (Malaysia)
- Portugal committed to becoming trans-fat free
- UK to host first ever Global Ministerial Summit on Mental Health (Oct 2018)
- Italy questioned application of fiscal policies to food and ingredients

Resolution WHA71.2

- Welcomes Montevideo Roadmap as a contribution to the preparatory process leading to the third High-level Meeting
- Urges Member States to be represented at the level of HoG at the UN HLM on NCDs and to call for action through a concise, action-oriented outcome document
- Request the DG to report to WHA 72, through the EB 144, on the outcomes of the HLM and its follow-up

11.1: Draft 13th General Programme of Work

Document <u>A71/14</u>

Member State Discussions

- Several Member States in the EURO and EMRO regions made direct reference to NCDs in their statements (Qatar, Pakistan, Netherlands, Finland)
- Investment case to accompany the GPW13 requested by the EB was not yet available

Resolution WHA71.1

- Approves the GPW13
- Requests the WHO DG to provide a report to the 75th WHA to inform potential extension to 2025 of the GPW13 in order to align with the wider UN planning cycle

11.4: Health, Environment and Climate Change

Document <u>A71/10</u>, <u>A71/10 Add.1</u>, <u>A71/11</u>

Member State Discussions

- Particular action needed to protect vulnerable populations
- Bulgaria: "Climate change affects everything and there is a need to promote actions that benefit everyone" other MS called for multisectoral action, action beyond health sector, and promotion of cobenefit outcomes
- Discussion about "no regrets measures"
- Noted the three reports prepared

WHO Secretariat

- Increased collaboration between cluster for climate and other determinants of health and NMH clusters in the lead up to HLM, taking the opportunity to address NCDs by reducing burden of air pollution and other environmental risks.
- "No regrets measures" simultaneously good for health and environment need to respect commitments made elsewhere including UNFCC and Convention on Biological Diversity. Best available evidence, continue to do so.
- "It will be necessary to find ways to uncouple economic growth and poverty alleviation from onvironmental degradation"



11.8: Preparation for a HLM on Ending Tuberculosis

Documents <u>A71/15</u>, <u>A71/16</u>, <u>A71/16 Add.1</u>, <u>A71/A/CONF/6</u>, <u>A71/A/CONF/6 Add.1</u>

Member State Discussions

- Need for multisectoral and multistakeholder approach to eliminate TB, with leadership at the highest level
- Importance of ensuring access to early diagnosis, quality & affordable treatment
- Integration of TB services into UHC; patient-centred approach; reaching vulnerable populations and those farthest behind

Resolution WHA71/3

- Requests WHO to support MS in preparation for HLM; implement Moscow Declaration; provide technical & strategic leadership and support; develop global strategy for TB research & innovation
- Present draft accountability framework at the HLM on 26 Sept
- Report to WHA72 on implementation of resolution

12.2: Physical Activity for Health

Documents A71/18, Draft global action plan on physical activity 2018–2030

Member State Discussions

- GAPPA warmly welcomed & wholeheartedly supported
- Contribution of PA to reducing burden of NCDs specifically, and more broadly to achieving SDGs
- South Africa: Links with physical environment need a multisectoral approach, create 'active systems' involving parents, educators, and employers
- India: Aims to include 200 million children in massive national sports programme
- Thailand OBO SEARO: Look forward to an era of PA for all, rather than only reducing physical inactivity
- Need monitoring and evaluation of framework, including reporting of disaggregated data

Resolution WHA71.6

- Adopts target of 15% reduction in prevalence of physical inactivity in adults and adolescents by 2030, & calls on WHO DG to:
- Implement GAPPA, providing support to MS with relevant partners;
- Finalise a monitoring and evaluation framework by December 2018;
- Produce the first global status report on physical activity before the end of 2020;
- Update the 2010 Global Recommendations on Physical Activity for Adolescents and Adults;
- Report to the WHA in 2021, 2026 & 2030

12.3: Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health

Documents A71/19 Rev.1

Member State Discussions

- Investing in women, girls, and adolescents essential for health and well-being of populations and for sustainable development
- Violence against girls and women a public health issue, implications for mental health
- Proper nutrition, especially during the first 1,000 days, key to development and health outcomes later in life
- Tensions on language around access to safe abortions some MS do not view it as a human right or component of maternal health, while others do

Secretariat Actions

- WHO to work with partners to develop guidelines to fast-track implementation of <u>Nurturing Care Framework</u>
- Accelerate implementation of <u>cervical cancer</u> flagship programme

12.4: mHealth

Document <u>A71/20</u>

Member State Discussions

- Transition complete from a Digital Health Revolution to a Digital Health Movement (India)
- Bolster health systems, enable widespread access to healthcare even in remote populations, daily support for people living with NCDs / other chronic conditions

Resolution WHA71.7

- 11 actions for Member States, including to consider how digital technologies could be integrated into existing health systems infrastructures; and to develop legislation and data protection policies around issues such as data access, sharing, consent, security privacy.
- 8 actions for WHO DG, including to provide technical assistance and normative guidance to Member States for scaling up the implementation of digital health; and to develop a repository on regulations, evidence related to improvements and unintended effects regarding health promotion, disease prevention, and access to health ser
- Report to be submitted to WHA73

12.6: Maternal, infant and young child nutrition

Documents A71/22, A71/23

Member State Discussions

- Primarily focused on welcoming biennial reports on *Maternal, infant and young child nutrition: Comprehensive implementation plan on maternal, infant and young child nutrition,* & *Safeguarding against possible conflicts of interest in nutrition programmes,* with strong support for protecting and promoting breastfeeding.
- 13 MS submitted a <u>Draft Resolution on Infant and Young Child Feeding</u>. Subsequently, the US proposed an <u>alternative decision point</u> on the Resolution and Member States spent the following 2 days in a drafting group negotiating a new Resolution that was finally proposed.

Resolution <u>A71.9</u>

• The IYCN <u>Resolution</u> adopted was sponsored by 18 MS, and while it is positive in that it reinforces the importance of protecting and promoting breastfeeding, it is not as strong as the original proposal, with references to supporting implementation of the WHO Code of Marketing for Infant Formula (The Code) and WHO Guidance on Ending the Inappropriate Promotion of Foods for Infants and Young Children weakened or removed entirely.

12.8: Rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease

Document A71/25

Member State Discussions

- Disproportionately affects vulnerable populations including women, children and indigenous peoples inextricably linked to SDoH; aligned with priorities of GPW13 and synergies with other SDGs
- Needs cross-WHO and whole of society approach, including communities
- Simple and cost-effective to prevent burden of disease

Resolution WHA71.14

- 5 actions for Member States, including to to address the socio-economic determinants of RHD, to improve access to timely healthcare and technologies
- Dispropotionately affects vulnerable populations including indigenous
- 3 actions for International Stakeholders, including for the international community to place RHD at the heart of the prevention and control agenda
- 5 actions for WHO DG, including to report on the extent of the burden and nature of RHD and to submit a report of progress to WHA74



- TOBACCO EXPLICITLY LISTED AS EU OFFENSIVE INTEREST
- LOWERED TARIFFS AND INCREASED FDI COULD MAKE HIGH FAT, SUGAR OR SALT FOOD AND DRINK MORE ACCESSIBLE
- EU PROPOSED WORDING COULD THREATEN PUBLIC HEALTH LABELLING SCHEMES
- COULD INCREASE SUGAR IMPORTS TO THE EU, OR PRODUCTION OF ISOGLUCOSE FROM IMPORTED MAIZE/WHEAT STARCH

Outcome Document for the HLM on NCDs

- Proposed <u>draft elements paper</u> for a *political declaration* presented on Thursday 7 June to Member States in NY
 - Entitled Time to Deliver: Accelerating our response to address NCDs for the health and well-being of present and future generations
- Language on health as a human right; mHealth; addressing childhood obesity; mental health; UHC; access to treatment; meaningful involvement of civil society & PLWNCDs; private sector engagement; accountability; financing; implementation of fiscal policies; UN review in 2025
- MS want concise, political document that does not reopen technical aspects agreed by WHO
- First informal negotiations take place Friday 29 June in NY

- NCDA to share analysis of draft elements with MS
- Encourage all to share proposed language over next week NCD Alliance

- Joint Civil Society <u>Statement</u> over 200 organisations signed on
